Survivor Restoration Program (SRP) 415-734-2312



The SARP Case Manager provides advocacy and support services for survivors of domestic and random violence whose perpetrators are participating in our custody offender programs. We assist survivors and coordinate referrals for safety planning and crisis interventions. Provide referrals and work in collaboration with appropriate agencies such as the DA's victim services, hospitals, housing, shelters, welfare offices, immigration, legal, employment, and financial institutions along with community based organizations as needed. Survivors are supported while navigating through family, criminal, civil appearances and other criminal justice and city agencies. SRP goals are to empower and transition clients to our SEP program.

SARP
Survivor Assessment Response Program

The SEP curriculum is designed for women survivors of domestic violence who are no longer in crisis and who are looking for extended services. The program consists of a 12-week commitment of classes held on Tuesdays from 5:30 – 7:30 pm, plus weekly case management sessions to help create and reach individual empowerment goals. Acupuncture is offered prior to each session. Child-watch is provided.

Survivor In-Custody Reentry Program

The SIRP case manager makes contact with incarcerated survivors of domestic violence and refers them to DV resources prior to them exiting custody. We provide survivors with a needs assessment, safety planning, domestic violence support groups, and connect clients to other Survivor Restoration Programs. SIRP also collaborates with in-custody and post release programs to provide clients with a reentry plan in preparation for their release.

Survivor Impact

Community Outreach Training

Using the principals of Restorative Justice Survivor Impact invites individuals who have experienced violence or who have been impacted by violence, to speak at the County Jail. Offenders are provided with the opportunity to hear the experiences of survivors of violence and the lifelong impact. Speakers share their story, which is often a part of their healing process. The presentations promote participant empathy by providing inmates with insights into how violence affects the victim/survivor and his/her family, friends, neighbors, the offender's family and the entire community.

SRP advocates are committed through trainings/presentations to raise awareness in our communities of the many challenges that survivors face and to increase sensitivity. SRP also raises awareness on the importance of Restorative Justice Programs that hold offenders accountable, repair the harm caused, survivor restoration, empowerment, and community involvement for both.
